IX. THE QUALIFICATIONS OF SHEPHERDS - SUMMARY

Core

- Above Reproach: In general, such a man presents a positive and attractive example of what it means to be a servant of Jesus.
- Exemplary Husband and Father: This man displays surpassing devotion to his wife and effectively coaches his family to follow the Lord.
- Good Heart: He loves the Lord (and whatever God loves) with all his heart, mind, and strength.

IX. THE QUALIFICATIONS OF SHEPHERDS - SUMMARY

Catalyst

- Relational Asset: He winsomely cares for and helps others do what is right, regardless of personal cost, without power struggles, self-promotion, or angry outbursts.
- Growth Agent: His deep personal devotion to God's word empowers him to promote the truth-driven transformation of others.

IX. THE QUALIFICATIONS OF SHEPHERDS - SUMMARY

Credibility

- Seasoned: This man has spent considerable time growing in humility and maturity.
- Respected: He lives out his allegiance to Jesus in the public square both by his example and witness.

- X. The Manner of Elders
 - A. Right Motivation: Doing It for the Right Reason
 - B. Right Work Ethic: Doing It by Working Hard

There is a right way and a wrong way to do the right thing.

ESSENTIAL FUNCTION

Elder: Man of seasoned character and maturity

Overseer: One who understands his people and is watching out for them

Shepherd: One who feeds, cares for, and protects the flock

Leader: One who governs by assessing and identifying what is best

Equipping: One who trains and outfits others for growth and effective ministry

Manage / Care for: One who is attentive to others in order to actively promote what is in their best interests

TOOLKIT

- He guards the flock. He identifies and confronts anything that threatens to undermine the spiritual welfare of members of the body.
- He teaches. He provides a healthy diet of truth to the sheep.
- He illustrates. He lives in a way that well reflects what he teaches.

TOOLKIT

- He helps the weak. He finds ways to deploy his money and resources to help those who are sick and weak.
- He prays for the sick. He comes as requested to minister to and pray for those who are seriously sick.
- He shows hospitality. He makes what is his available to others when it will serve their true good or advance the cause of Christ.

X. THE MANNER OF ELDERS

Right Motivation

Therefore, I exhort the elders among you, as your fellow elder and witness of the sufferings of Christ, and a partaker also of the glory that is to be revealed, shepherd the flock of God among you, exercising oversight (1) not under compulsion, but voluntarily, according to the will of God; and (2) not for sordid gain, but with eagerness; (3) nor yet as lording it over those allotted to your charge, but proving to be examples to the flock (1 Peter 5:1–3).

X. THE MANNER OF ELDERS

Right Motivation

Wrong Ways to Shepherd

- Under compulsion
- For sordid gain
- Lording it over those allotted to your charge

Right Ways to Shepherd

- Voluntarily, according to the will of God
- With eagerness
- Proving to be examples to the flock

Right Motivation – pair 1

- Not Because You Have to but Because You Choose To
- Shepherd the flock of God among you, exercising oversight not under compulsion, but voluntarily, according to the will of God (1 Peter 5:2).
- The adverb translated "under compulsion" is a NT hapax, but the apostle Paul uses similar terms elsewhere.

X. THE MANNER OF ELDERS

Right Motivation – pair 1

- Each one must do just as he has purposed in his heart, not grudgingly or under compulsion, for God loves a cheerful giver (2 Corinthians 9:7).
- He wants shepherds to serve as a personal choice, a responsibility they freely, even gladly, assume.
- In the NASB, "according to the will of God" renders just two words, kata and theos (κατά and θεός, literally "according to God").

X. THE MANNER OF ELDERS

Right Motivation – pair 1

I now rejoice, not that you were made sorrowful, but that you were made sorrowful to the point of repentance; for you were made sorrowful according to the will of God, so that you might not suffer loss in anything through us. For the sorrow that is according to the will of God produces a repentance without regret, leading to salvation, but the sorrow of the world produces death (2 Corinthians 7:9-10).

X. THE MANNER OF ELDERS

- "According to God" means "because God wills it."
- Peter wants shepherds to embrace the role of a shepherd as a response to God. He is inviting them to do this willingly because they sense this is what God is asking of them.
- "Why would someone serve as an elder under compulsion?"

Right Motivation – pair 1

- When someone's heart isn't in it, his service as a shepherd will be joyless and ultimately ineffectual. He will look for ways to do the minimum. He will shy away from the hard things. He will engage only when "he has to."
- The man who serves as a shepherd voluntarily as a response to God, does so habitually. Saying "yes" to God is his normal even when sheep get cranky!

X. THE MANNER OF ELDERS

Right Motivation – pair 2

- Not as a Means to an End, but as the End
- The second "right way, wrong way" pair takes what Peter has already said and bumps it up a notch.
- Peter counsels his fellow-elders, Shepherd the flock of God among you ... not for sordid gain, but with eagerness (1 Peter 5:2).
- The phrase "for sordid gain" renders a single Greek adverb that is only found here in the New Testament.

X. THE MANNER OF ELDERS

Right Motivation – pair 2

- But the cognate adjective is used in Titus 1:7 of one of the qualifications for an elder.
- Together, they constitute a double warning.
- The man who is "exercising oversight ... for sordid gain" (1 Peter 5:2) is leveraging his position as an elder for personal benefit.
- Peter has seen this toxic motive up close and personal.

X. THE MANNER OF ELDERS

- When Mary gave Jesus an extravagant gift, Judas threw up a smokescreen, saying, "Why was this perfume not sold for three hundred denarii and given to poor people?" Now he said this, not because he was concerned about the poor, but because he was a thief, and as he had the money box, he used to pilfer what was put into it (John 12:5-6).
- It did not turn out well for Judas. It will not turn out well for shepherds who are "takers."

Right Motivation – pair 2

- The right way to shepherd is eagerly.
- The adverb translated "with eagerness" is a New Testament hapax.
- Cognates are found elsewhere: So, for my part, I am eager to preach the gospel to you also who are in Rome (Romans 1:15).

X. THE MANNER OF ELDERS

Right Motivation – pair 2

- Now these were more noble-minded than those in Thessalonica, for they received the word with great eagerness, examining the Scriptures daily to see whether these things were so (Acts 17:11).
- The eager shepherd exercises oversight with passion and animation. He derives genuine satisfaction from shepherding irrespective of others' notice or validation.

X. THE MANNER OF ELDERS

Right Motivation – pair 2

- God's shepherds do what they do with excitement for what they do.
- They are not oblivious to the promise of a heavenly reward, but that is not their core motivation.
- They find the challenge of shepherding to be its own reward. They can't stop thinking about how to lead well those entrusted to their care. They are a joy to follow.

X. THE MANNER OF ELDERS

- When you couple "eager" with "voluntarily according to the will of God" (1 Peter 5:2), here's what you get:
- Because they exercise oversight voluntarily, effective shepherds do what they do as a personal response to a divine calling. Because they are eager, they do it with enthusiasm.

Right Motivation – pair 3

- Not to Compel People to Do It Your Way but to Show Them His Way
- Shepherd the flock of God among you ... nor yet as lording it over those allotted to your charge, but proving to be examples to the flock (1 Peter 5:2-3).
- The elder who is fond of sordid gain has a hidden agenda. The overlord's agenda is out there for all to see: "It's all about me!"

X. THE MANNER OF ELDERS

Right Motivation – pair 3

- The word translated "lording it over" is a present participle, which indicates that this is an ongoing pattern of behavior.
- And the man, in whom was the evil spirit, leaped on them and subdued all of them and overpowered them, so that they fled out of that house naked and wounded (Acts 19:16). Scary! To "lord it over" the flock is to subdue the sheep, to bend them to your will, to make them do your bidding.

X. THE MANNER OF ELDERS

Right Motivation – pair 3

- Peter was there when Jesus once used this exact word: Calling them to Himself, Jesus said to them, "You know that those who are recognized as rulers of the Gentiles lord it over them; and their great men exercise authority over them. But it is not this way among you, but whoever wishes to become great among you shall be your servant" (Mark 10:42–43).
- Peter is echoing what he heard from Jesus at the very start of his ministry.

X. THE MANNER OF ELDERS

- Perhaps he still heard the voice of Jesus ringing in his head: Lordship leadership? Bad! Servant leadership? Good!
- Shepherds should consistently ask themselves, "What can I do to serve the Lord's interests in the life of this person or these people?" This awareness ought to also insulate a shepherd against the pull of this question, "What can I do to get the sheep to do what I want or to serve my interests?"

Right Motivation – pair 3

- "Lordship leadership" "tells"
- The shepherd or elder who wants everything to be "perfect" so that it reflects well on him comes to mind. This, in turn, fuels micromanagement. He wants everything to be positive and appear successful. He has a vision of what should be, and he wants everyone to serve his vision. He doesn't want others to meddle with or attempt to improve his plan.

X. THE MANNER OF ELDERS

Right Motivation – pair 3

- He just wants the flock to serve his plan—with no questions asked. Ultimately, he cares only for himself.
- Instead of adopting "Operation Overlord," good shepherds are good examples.
- Such elders ought to be able to say, along with the apostle Paul, The things you have learned and received and heard and seen in me, practice these things (Philippians 4:9).

X. THE MANNER OF ELDERS

Right Motivation – pair 3

- Paul encouraged both Timothy and Titus to adopt this ministry strategy for themselves: Let no one look down on your youthfulness, but rather in speech, conduct, love, faith and purity, show yourself an example of those who believe (1 Timothy 4:12).
- In all things show yourself to be an example of good deeds, with purity in doctrine, dignified (Titus 2:7).

X. THE MANNER OF ELDERS

- Shepherds serve their flocks well when they present a positive example of what it means to follow the Chief Shepherd.
- Bottom line: An effective shepherd doesn't drive people. He inspires others by his example. He vividly demonstrates what the Chief Shepherd desires for His flock. How he lives shows the way.

Motivation Summary

- Shepherd's motives matter!
- In 1 Peter 5:1–3, we identify three ways a shepherd can get it right (and three ways to get it wrong).
- (1) The shepherd who effectively watches over his flock does so not because he has to, but because he has said "yes" to God's call.
- (2) The good shepherd is not using his role as a means to some self-serving end; he is in it for the sheer joy of doing what counts.

X. THE MANNER OF ELDERS

Motivation Summary

- (3) The shepherd who cares for his flock for the right reason is not in it to compel others to do what he wants. He draws others to Jesus' way by his inspiring example.
- He does what he does for the right reason: He is called, eager, and exemplary.

X. THE MANNER OF ELDERS

Right Work Ethic

- Right Work Ethic: Doing It by Working Hard
- Shepherding involves hard work.
- Just so we don't miss it, Paul says as much four different times: Or he who exhorts, in his exhortation; he who gives, with liberality; he who leads, with diligence; he who shows mercy, with cheerfulness (Romans 12:8).

X. THE MANNER OF ELDERS

Right Work Ethic

- In everything I showed you that by working hard in this manner you must help the weak and remember the words of the Lord Jesus, that He Himself said, "It is more blessed to give than to receive" (Acts 20:35).
- But we request of you, brethren, that you appreciate those who diligently labor among you, and have charge over you in the Lord and give you instruction (1 Thessalonians 5:12).

Right Work Ethic

- The elders who rule well are to be considered worthy of double honor, especially those who work hard at preaching and teaching (1 Timothy 5:17).
- The man who watches out for others "when it's convenient" and "when his schedule allows" is not "exercising oversight" well.
- The apostle Paul provides a helpful "work ethic" insight.

X. THE MANNER OF ELDERS

Right Work Ethic

- Hope helps! For it is for this we labor and strive, because we have fixed our hope on the living God, who is the Savior of all men, especially of believers (1 Timothy 4:10).
- The Lord's servants are "all in" because it will be worth it. Knowing ours is not wasted effort makes it easier to work harder.

X. THE MANNER OF ELDERS

Right Work Ethic

- Holding fast the word of life, so that in the day of Christ I will have reason to glory because I did not run in vain nor toil in vain (Philippians 2:16).
- A shepherd can know his hard work is not for naught, and that makes it easier to stay motivated until "the day of Christ."
- Bonus Insight! For this purpose also I labor, striving according to His power, which mightily works within me (Colossians 1:29).

X. THE MANNER OF ELDERS

Right Work Ethic

- This is the shepherd laborer's secret. As he works hard, God blesses his efforts to accomplish something that truly matters.
- From a practical standpoint, I like to think of this contrast. Imagine someone who keeps a garden as a hobby. Now imagine someone whose garden is his only means of feeding himself and his family.

Right Work Ethic

- We invest in our flock like we are dealing with life for our family—because we are!
- Summary: Effective shepherds do whatever is necessary to care for their flock. They understand what it means to roll up their sleeves and work hard at leading, helping those who are in trouble, and ministering the truth.

X. THE MANNER OF ELDERS

Right Recall

- Right Recall: Doing It from Memory!
- Therefore be on the alert, remembering that night and day for a period of three years I did not cease to admonish each one with tears (Acts 20:31)
- In everything I showed you that by working hard in this manner you must help the weak and remember the words of the Lord Jesus, that He Himself said, "It is more blessed to give than to receive" (Acts 20:35).

X. THE MANNER OF ELDERS

Right Recall

- Effective shepherds draw from memory what fuels their effectiveness as shepherds. Specifically, they remember two things.
- "Staying alert" is what shepherds must do.
- The phrase that follows begins with the word "remembering." This is the way to stay alert: by holding something in their thoughts.

X. THE MANNER OF ELDERS

Right Recall

- The verb form of "remembering" (present tense) suggests this is an ongoing activity.
- The content is captured in this summary: Night and day for a period of three years I did not cease to admonish each one with tears (Acts 20:31).
- At a minimum, Paul is calling for the elders to recall his example; night and day, for three years, one-onone with each of them, he ministered to a point of tears.

Right Recall

- He also wants them to remember what he actually said when they were at risk.
- Paul wants the Ephesian shepherds to remember two things: his admonition and his example, i.e., what he taught and what it cost.
- The word "admonish" summarizes what Paul taught

 this is instruction suited to those who are "unruly"
 (1 Thessalonians 5:14).

X. THE MANNER OF ELDERS

Right Recall

- This does not mean that one who is admonished is an opponent: Yet do not regard him as an enemy, but admonish him as a brother (2 Thessalonians 3:15).
- So, when Paul is calling the Ephesian shepherds to guard the flock by remembering his personal admonitions, he is asking them to call to mind exactly how he spotted and addressed spiritual hindrances.

X. THE MANNER OF ELDERS

Right Recall

- He wants them to ask themselves, "How did Paul address this when we were working through it? What did he say? What did he do?"
- Although an elder's core skill set includes both teaching and admonition, the latter is particularly well suited to a shepherd's work as a watchman and guardian.

X. THE MANNER OF ELDERS

Right Recall

- How can we "remember?" We have the actual letters of Paul!
- For example, consider the first letter to the Corinthians. In it, Paul brings truth to bear on numerous threats, including divisions, church discipline, sexual immorality, lawsuits among believers, questions about marriage, Christian liberty, idolatry, worship compromise, misuse of spiritual gifts, and resurrection errors.

Right Recall

- As we encounter something similar, we can recall the right principles and use them to help us see what we are dealing with and how to address it.
- So when Paul says to elders, "Be on the alert, remembering my admonition," we heed his counsel today by internalizing the word. Then we can access our memory banks to locate whatever speaks to the latest challenge.

X. THE MANNER OF ELDERS

Right Recall

- Shepherds who shepherd well do so, in part, because they have committed God's word to memory. They have also meditated on the implications of this internalized word and can aptly deploy it when engaged in a ministry of admonition.
- They acquire a vast internal store of principles from God's word that are at the ready as required. Such men will indeed shepherd well!

X. THE MANNER OF ELDERS

Right Recall

- There is another memory based ministry aid Paul wants elder / shepherds to use.
- Remember What Matters!
- In everything I showed you that by working hard in this manner you must help the weak and remember the words of the Lord Jesus, that He Himself said, "It is more blessed to give than to receive" (Acts 20:35).

X. THE MANNER OF ELDERS

Right Recall

- In Acts 20:35, Paul commands the elders to embrace their responsibility to "help the weak," which we have previously considered. That is what shepherds are to do.
- Working hard to help the weak is more easily accomplished when shepherds remember something Jesus said: "It is more blessed to give than to receive."

Right Recall

- This declaration by Jesus is not found anywhere in the gospels.
- The word translated "blessed" (makarios, μακάριος) is quite common in the gospels.
- "But when you give a reception, invite the poor, the crippled, the lame, the blind, and you will be blessed, since they do not have the means to repay you" (Luke 14:13–14).

X. THE MANNER OF ELDERS

Right Recall

- In an explanatory phrase to follow, this blessing is identified: You will be repaid at the resurrection of the righteous (Luke 14:14).
- So, when Jesus says it is more blessed to give than to receive, He is identifying what He values. The giver does what Jesus appreciates. In the future, this will come out. When it does, the one who has helped those in need at personal expense will say, "That was so worth it."

X. THE MANNER OF ELDERS

Right Recall

- For shepherds who work hard to help the weak, they do well to keep the words of Jesus in mind.
- They should gaze into the future and hear Jesus say of them that they are to be congratulated! He will declare that they have done what matters to Him! Well done!

X. THE MANNER OF ELDERS

Summary

Shepherds/Overseers/Leaders/Elders can well fulfill their responsibilities using these effectiveness multipliers:

- Right motivation Do it for the right reason!
- Right work ethic Do it by working hard!
- Right recall Do it by remembering!


